PDUs During the Pandemic

We're living in a time where we've certainly had to get creative in how we do things, both in our personal and professional lives. In the child life world, one area we have had to think outside the box in is how we will continue the education and training necessary to maintain our needed competencies.

Many child life specialists pursue most of their professional development through conferences. However, the availability of in person conferences stopped with COVID-19. Suddenly many child life specialists shifted from planning travel and hotel rooms to preparing to participate in virtual sessions (e.g., wondering how in the world to pay attention to sessions in the presence of distractions from home).

To help professionals continue to have access to opportunities for professional development, ACLP got creative and shifted to a virtual conference. Following in the footsteps of the ACLP national conference, several regional child life groups are taking their conferences online. Both the Great Lakes Association of Child Life Professionals and the Texas Association of Child Life Professionals will go virtual this fall. Their day-long conferences will provide PDUs without leaving your home (or office).

This prompted the Communications Committee to think about other options that may count toward our professional development.

• Is your hospital a member of an organization (e.g., The Beryl Institute) that provides online webinars for members?

- · Check out national organizations online (e.g., palliative care groups). Many offer webinars.
- Are there learning opportunities available via local organizations (Red Cross, community hospices)?

• Are you still out there providing in-services to new employees, residents or other groups? You, as the presenter, can get PDUs for your time. You don't get credit every time you present the same lecture, but you can get PDUs for the initial presentation.

• Creating a presentation and providing an in-service to your team. Not only are you getting PDUs for presenting, you're helping your team obtain PDUs. The guidelines are simple: it must relate to one of the Exam Content Outline domains, be at least thirty minutes in length, and have the appropriate documentation.

• Serving on a hospital committee or local board in your community? If it can be tied to the Exam Content Outline domains, this time also counts toward PDUs.

- Taking a class with a university?
- Publishing a paper or article?
- Reading the Child Life Focus and taking a quiz?

Many of these resources are right at your fingertips. So, in a time where traditional conference attendance may not be possible, get out there and make those PDUs work for you!

The Child Life Certification Commission (CLCC) revised the Child Life Code of Ethics over a period of several months and finalized the document in January 2020. Certified Child Life Specialists, some who have been trained in pediatric bioethics, as well as medical ethics experts from fields outside of Child Life, collaborated to revise the Code. This is part of a revision to the ACLP publication <u>Making Ethical Decisions in Child Life Practice</u> which is complete and in press. The work group benchmarked codes of ethics from other professions and conducted several working sessions with experts to complete the revision to the Child Life Code of Ethics.

The general purpose for a Child Life Code of Ethics in the child life profession is to help child life specialists recognize considerations when professional duties are not entirely clear or when ethical uncertainties arise. The Child Life Code of Ethics provides standards to which we hold ourselves accountable and to which the general public can hold child life specialists accountable.

Some goals for the revision to the Code included using more inclusive language and as per best practice, shifting the focus away from "rules" for behavior and instead using statements based on ethical principles that serve to guide one's decision-making process when faced with a dilemma. The latter is in large part the reason the previous "2-year requirement" for entering into a personal relationship was removed. There had been no evidence that there was something significant about that period of time. There could be some circumstances that may require an even longer period of time to elapse before changing the nature of one's relationship with a patient or family member. The critical aspect is that the relationship has surely come to a close without significant chance for another encounter with the patient and family. This is one example of the content in the revised Child Life Code of Ethics shifting away from rules to a more guided approach; encouraging the professional to make ethical decisions based on the circumstances while gaining guidance from the code to help determine decisions.

The revised code also has a shift in language, for example, the word *shall* has been replaced throughout the document. The rationale for the language shift is similar to the rationale already provided in this writing, the shift from the code being viewed as a set of rules to being more about guidance. When we move away from a word like *shall* it provides the professional more guidance to be responsible and act in an ethical manner instead of being told that they *shall* or *should* do something.

The Ethics Committee of the CLCC looks forward to the release of the revised <u>Making Ethical</u> <u>Decisions in Child Life Practice</u> book and to providing more information, rationale, and answering any questions related to our Code of Ethics and ethics in general. 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Certification Maintenance

ACLP is waiving the reinstatement fees for those who have yet to pay their certification annual maintenance fees. Ninety-eight individuals currently have an inactive certification status due to non-payment of the 2020 certification maintenance fee. Existing annual maintenance fees are due by 12/31/2020 to avoid loss of the CCLS credential.

Reinstatement applications will be accepted through December 31, 2020.

Roughly 98% of CCLSs who owed this fee have made their payment.
